Summary Code of Conduct



Introduction

Geneva City School District wants each person to learn in a safe, positive environment where every teacher is able to provide excellent instruction and every student has an equal and rich opportunity to learn.

In order to create this space, there are norms and behaviors that must be in place. There are three levels of support to help students be successful in their personal, social, and academic lives. We work to help students:

- Learn from mistakes.
- Understand why a specific behavior is unacceptable.
- Realize harm caused and the consequences of their actions.
- Understand what they could have done differently in a situation.
- Take responsibility for their actions.
- Be given the chance to learn social skills and skills to use in the future.
- Understand that consequences become larger if negative behaviors continue.

^{*}Students may be disciplined for conduct that happens outside of the school that may endanger the health or safety of students or has a negative effect on the learning environment.

Where and When the Code Applies

- In school and on school property during school hours.
- Before and after school, while on school property.
- While traveling in vehicles funded by the Geneva City School District.
- At all school-sponsored events, regardless of the location.
- At non-school events when such behavior can be demonstrated to negatively affect the educational process or to endanger the health, safety, morals, or welfare of the school community.

Rights & Responsibilities

Students Have the Right To:

- Go to school in their district of residence and receive a free and appropriate education from age 5 to 21.
- A quality education from Pre-K through 12th grade in a safe, secure learning environment.



- Be treated with respect, fairness, and dignity by other students, and staff.
- Express their spoken or written opinions, with help if needed.
- Participate in all district activities on an equal basis regardless of race, color, creed, religion, religious practices, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, national origin, ethnic group, political affiliation, age, marital status, or disability.
- Tell their version of an event to school adults deciding on an appropriate consequence.
- Have access to information on drug and alcohol abuse, and people who can provide direct help to students with serious personal problems.
- Be protected from intimidation, harassment, or discrimination based on actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, or religious practice, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, or disability, by employees or students on school property or at a school-sponsored event, function or activity (The Dignity for All Students Act).

Student Dress Code

- Must wear non-transparent clothing that covers all body parts which includes:
 - A shirt with fabric in the front, the back, and sides that covers the chest, torso, and back.
 - Bottoms (pants, jeans, shorts, leggings, sweatpants, skirts, dresses, etc.)
- Shoes (sneakers, boots, sandals, flip-flops, slides, flats, heels, etc.)
- Middle and high school students: Hats and bandanas, head wraps, including do-rags, and other headwear (hoodies can be worn, but hoods cannot be up) are allowed.
- A person's face must be visible to staff and not block the line of sight of any student or staff.
- Clothing must be appropriate for all scheduled classroom activities, including physical education, science labs, technology class, and other activities where unique hazards and or circumstances may exist.
 - Physical Education: sweatpants or shorts, athletic shoes. No slip-ons, heels, Uggs, boots, slippers, or flip-flops. Shoes should surround the ankle for protection.
- Clothing may not depict, advertise, or advocate the use of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana, or other controlled substances.
- Clothing may not depict pornography, nudity or sexual acts, or feature profanity.
- Clothing may not use or depict hate speech targeting groups based on race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, gender, religion, or any other protected groups.
- May not wear accessories that could be dangerous or could be used as a weapon.
- May not wear blankets or other coverings that are not intended to be clothing.

Anyone who violates the dress code will be required to cover, remove, or replace the item in question.

Additional or repeated violations of the dress code will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis. Students refusing to comply with the consequences will face appropriate, progressive school discipline.

Electronics Policy

Technology, Media, & Personal Device Policy

We know that it is important to know how to use technology responsibly. Students are responsible for accidental or intentional damage or loss of their school issued chromebook and electronics. Students must bring their district chromebook to school each day fully charged and may not bring their own device to use at school. The district is not liable for the loss, damage, misuse, or theft of any personal electronic device.

Offenses will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis.

Elementary (grades Pre-K-5) students are required to keep devices off and stowed away during the school day. In emergency situations, a school administrator can grant a student access to their phone.

Personal electronics at Geneva Middle School and Geneva High School will be divided into "zones" using a colorcoding system – green, yellow, or red. Electronics must be used according to the code of conduct expectations whether district owned or personal.

The following activities and behaviors are prohibited in school:

Using the district's computer system to obtain, view, download, send, print, display, or otherwise gain access to or



send materials that are unlawful, obscene, pornographic, or abusive.

- Harassing, insulting, bullying, threatening, or attacking others.
- Damaging, disabling, or otherwise interfering with the operation of computers, computer systems, software, or related equipment through physical action or electronic means.
- Using unauthorized software on the district's computer system.
- Changing, copying, renaming, deleting, reading, or otherwise accessing files or software not created by the student without express permission from the computer coordinator.
- Violating copyright law, including the illegal file sharing of music, videos, and software.
- Using the district's computer system for non-educational, commercial purposes, product advertisement, or political lobbying.
- Disclosing an individual's password to others or using others' passwords.
- Transmitting material, information, or software in violation of any district policy or regulation, the district code of conduct, or federal, state, and local law or regulation.
- Revealing personal information about students or colleagues.
- Accessing personal, interactive sites (including social media) unless under the direct supervision of a staff member. This includes the use of a student's personal cell phone or digital device to access such social networking sites.
- Creating or using a website, blog, or social media platform to cause a substantial disruption in the school environment or interfere with the rights of others.
- Using a digital device, electronic technology, or media to facilitate cheating or plagiarism.
- Using electronic devices to create audio or video recordings of students or staff members without their consent.

Prohibited Student Conduct

Students may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including suspension from school, when they:

A) Engage in conduct that is disorderly

Cell Phone and Smart Device Policy: Classrooms are a NO CELL PHONE zone.

- Students who use an electronic device to take video, audio, or photos of students in a conflict, fight, or bullying will face administrative discipline, including suspension from school and extracurricular privileges. This may apply to students who take videos of staff or students without their permission.
- Teachers may give students permission to use personal electronics in class for an educational reason. This permission always pertains to a single instance.
- Other smart devices such as smart watches must not be connected to the internet in any way during the school day. The expectation is that these devices are set to "airplane mode" or the wifi is turned off.



To efficiently communicate the appropriate type of cell phone usage, the school will be divided into zones using a color coding system - green, yellow, or red. Refer to the table above. Students who violate the district cell phone or electronic policy during the school day may be subject to the following:

- Device taken by an administrator and returned at the end of the day
- Lunch detention, parent/guardian notification, device taken by an administrator and returned at the end of the day
- Half-day suspension, parent/guardian notification, device taken by an administrator and returned at the end of the
- Full-day suspension, parent/guardian notification, device taken by an administrator and returned at the end of the

Carrying an electronic device in a pocket or "out of sight" in a red zone does not constitute a violation of these rules.

Medical Exemptions to Electronics Policy

Parents, quardians, or students should contact the health office or their counselor, and the school will notify teachers if students need access to their cell phones for medical reasons during instructional times.

- * During emergency situations, it is important that the district is able to communicate effectively with students: therefore, students are not permitted to use electronic devices during emergency situations.
- * The Geneva City School District is not responsible for damage or loss of personal property. Nor is the district responsible for locating personal property that has allegedly been stolen or lost.

B) Engage in conduct that is violent

Weapons on School Grounds

Except for law enforcement officers, no person may have a weapon on school grounds, in any district building, school bus/district vehicle, or at a school-sponsored activity or setting.

Discipline may include a mandatory suspension for a period of not less than one (1) calendar year.

Gun-Free Schools Act: Any person who has brought a "weapon" or "firearm" to school will be referred by the superintendent to the appropriate law officials or agency.

- C) Engage in any conduct that endangers the safety, physical or mental health, or welfare of others.
- D) Engage in misconduct while on a school bus.
- E) Engage in any form of academic misconduct.
- F) Engage in off-campus misconduct that interferes with or can reasonably be expected to substantially disrupt the educational process in the school or at a school function.

Assigned Consequences, Procedures, & Referrals

We believe that discipline is the most effective when it deals directly with the problem at the time and place that it happens, in a fair and just way. We aim to:



- Address behaviors that are physically, emotionally, or educationally harmful.
- Help students understand the impact and harm their actions have caused.
- Teach students skills to make positive choices that improve relationships and build confidence and accountability.
- Supply a path to repairing relationships and provide ideas on how to better handle situations in the future.
- Be firm, fair, and consistent.

In determining the appropriate restorative action, the following will be considered:

- Student's age.
- Nature of the offense and the circumstances which led to the offense.
- Student's prior disciplinary record.
- Effectiveness of other forms of discipline.
- Information from parents, teachers, or others, as appropriate.
- Other extenuating circumstances.

Types of Suspension

Students must be informed of the alleged misconduct and staff must investigate the facts surrounding it. All students will have an opportunity to present their version of the facts.

Detention and Alternative to Suspension

Teachers, assistant principals, principals, and the superintendent may assign after-school or Saturday detention or Alternative to Suspension (ATS) as a consequence for student misconduct. This will include the restorative process of meeting and discussing what happened, how it was harmful, and a plan to repair harm, and how to respond more positively the next time. Parents and guardians will be informed.

Suspension from transportation

If a student does not conduct themselves properly on a bus, the bus driver will notify the principal. Students may have their riding privileges suspended by the building principal or the superintendent.

The student and their parents or quardians will have an opportunity to conference with the building administration to discuss the conduct and consequences. The parties involved will have a discussion about how their actions caused harm, supply a path to repairing the relationship that was harmed, and ideas on how to better handle situations in the future.

Suspension from athletic participation, extracurricular activities, and other privileges

The student and their parents or guardians will have an opportunity to conference with the building administration to discuss the conduct and consequences. The parties involved will have a discussion about how their actions caused harm, supply a path to repairing the relationship that was harmed, and ideas on how to better handle situations in the future.



In-school suspension

The student and their parents or quardians will have an opportunity to conference with the building administration to discuss the conduct and consequences. The parties involved will have a discussion about how their actions caused harm, supply a path to repairing the relationship that was harmed, and ideas on how to better handle situations in the future.

Suspension from school

Suspension from school may occur when a student is violent, excessively defiant, disobedient, violent, disruptive, or endangers the safety, morals, health, or well-being of others. Staff will notify the principal or superintendent with a written referral. The parties involved will have a discussion about how their actions caused harm, supply a path to repairing the relationship that was harmed, and ideas on how to better handle situations in the future.

Short-term out-of-school suspension (five days or less)

Students will be notified by the principal or superintendent. If the student denies the misconduct, an explanation of reasoning behind the suspension will be provided. Parents and quardians will be notified in writing of the suspension within 24 hours of the decision and provided with a description of the incident and misconduct. Families may request a conference with the principal in their dominant language and may appeal the suspension decision within five days, in which case the decision is reviewed by the superintendent. A re-entry meeting is required to put supportive plans in place to help the student in the future. Parents and guardians will be invited to participate in these meetings.

Long-term (more than five days) suspension from school

Students and their parents or quardians will be given notice of their right to a fair hearing at which the student has the right to representation, present witnesses and evidence, and to question witnesses against them. The hearing will be recorded via tape and led by the superintendent or a hearing officer. Families may appeal the decision within 30 days. The suspension will include a follow-up meeting between the principal, superintendent or designee, and Board of Education to address guestions such as: Has the behavior improved? Do other issues need to be addressed? What is the student's plan moving forward? A re-entry meeting is required to put supportive plans in place to help the student in the future. Parents and guardians will be invited to participate in these meetings.

Permanent suspension

Permanent suspension is only for extreme circumstances, including but not limited to a student's conduct posing a life-threatening danger to the safety and well-being of another person.

Minimum Periods of Suspension

For the safety of students and school staff, some behaviors call for a minimum period of suspension. The student and parents or guardians will be notified of the disciplinary action and given an opportunity for an informal conference for short-term suspensions or a hearing for long-term suspensions.

Bringing a weapon to school: at least one calendar year and/or legal action.

Persons who commit violent acts other than bringing a weapon to school: suspension from school for at least five days.

Persons who are repeatedly substantially disruptive (four or more times) during a semester: suspension for at least five days.



Counseling

Person In Need of Supervision

The district may file a petition in Family Court on any student under the age of 18 who shows that they require supervision and treatment by:

- Being consistently absent.
- Engaging in an ongoing or continual course of conduct that makes the student consistently disobedient and unable to adhere to school norms, rules, and expectations.
- Knowingly and unlawfully possessing marijuana.

Juvenile Delinguents & Juvenile Offenders

The superintendent is required to refer the following students to the county attorney for a juvenile delinquency proceeding before the Family Court:

- Any student under the age of 16 who is found to have brought a weapon to school.
- Any student 14 or 15 years old who qualifies for juvenile offender status.
- The superintendent is required to refer students aged 16 and older or any student 14 or 15 years old who qualifies for juvenile offender status to the appropriate law enforcement authorities.

Special Rules Regarding the Suspension or Discipline of Students with Disabilities

The district's Committee on Special Education will:

- Examine why a student is displaying a behavior and make or review a behavior plan when a student with a disability is first suspended or removed for more than 10 school days or is changing placements due to a suspension or removal involving weapons, illegal drugs, or controlled substances.
- Conduct a manifestation determination review of the relationship between the student's disability and the conduct in question whenever a decision is made to move a student's placement for misconduct involving weapons, illegal drugs, or controlled substances or because maintaining the student in their current educational setting poses a risk of harm to the student or others, or a decision is made to impose a suspension that constitutes a disciplinary change in placement.
- Students with disabilities will be provided services required by the state's regulations during any period of suspension or removal.

Corporal Punishment

Corporal punishment is any act of physical force upon a student for the purpose of punishing that student. Corporal punishment of any student by any district employee is strictly forbidden.

In situations where alternative procedures and methods that do not involve the use of physical force cannot reasonably be used, reasonable physical force may be used to:

- Protect oneself, another student, teacher, or any person from physical injury.
- Protect someone from hurting themselves.
- Protect the property of the school or others.



Restrain or remove a student whose behavior interferes with the orderly exercise and performance of school district functions, powers, and duties if that student has refused to refrain from further disruptive acts

Student Searches & Interrogations

In order to keep our schools safe, students and their possessions may be searched for illegal substances or objects that pose a threat to the health, safety, welfare, or morals of the schools. Any illegal or forbidden materials will be turned over to an appropriate law enforcement and the students' parents or guardians notified. Any school official may question a student about an alleged violation of law or the district code of conduct without contacting a student's parents or quardians or conduct searches of students and their belongings under reasonable suspicion. Students will be told why they are being questioned and asked to admit that they possess physical evidence or have violated the law or code of conduct. Whenever possible, searches will be done in the privacy of administrative offices and students will be present when their possessions are being searched. Searches will be conducted in the presence of two adults whenever possible.

Student Lockers, Desks, & Other School Storage Places

The student search rules in this code of conduct do not apply to student lockers, desks, and other school storage places, and school officials have complete control over them. These places may be searched at any time without prior notice or consent.

Strip Searches

Under no circumstances will any school personnel conduct a strip search of any other person. Removal of an outer coat or jacket or shoes and socks does not count as strip search. In the event that this type of search is required, the police will be called.

Documentation of Searches

- Name, age, and grade of student searched.
- Reasons for the search.
- Name of any informant(s).
- Purpose of search (that is, what item(s) were being sought).
- Type and scope of search.
- Person conducting search and their title and position.
- Witnesses, if any, to the search.
- Time and location of search.
- Results of search (that is, what items(s) were found).
- Disposition of items found.
- Time, manner, and results of parental notification.

Items taken from the student and will be documented and kept by the principal until turned over to the police.

Interrogation of Students Suspected of Possession or Consumption of Alcohol

All authorized district staff may investigate the suspected consumption or use of alcohol, marijuana, or illegal substances on school property or at a school function. Such investigations may include (but are not limited to):



- Searching student lockers, desks, and other storage spaces.
- Searching student clothing.
- Questioning students.
- Conducting pre-screening tests (e.g., examining coordination, mannerisms, speech).
- Using hand-held breath test devices.

Police Involvement in Searches and Interrogations of Students

District officials will work with police officials and other law enforcement authorities to keep a safe school environment. Police officials may enter school property or a school function to question or search a student or to conduct a formal investigation involving students only if they have:

- A search or an arrest warrant; or
- Probable cause to believe a crime has been committed on school property or at a school function; or
- Been requested by school officials to investigate a reported or suspected crime.
- Parents or guardians must be notified by law enforcement for police questioning of students under 16. Although students under 16 may be questioned by school officials, they may not give consent for police questioning.

Child Protective Services Investigations

Adults who suspect that a student has been abused or maltreated will report their concern to the principal, who will schedule an interview with Child Protective Services (CPS). A school nurse must be present if clothing is removed. CPS may not remove a student from school property without a court order, unless the worker reasonably believes that the student would be in danger or abused if they were not removed from school before a court order can reasonably be obtained.

Searches of Student Vehicles

A student's unlocked vehicle on school grounds may be searched if there is reasonable suspicion to believe that the vehicle contains contraband in violation of the law or this code of conduct. A trunk is considered unlocked if the passenger compartment is unlocked and the trunk lid can be released from within the passenger compartment. If the vehicle is locked, the school official should ask the student to unlock the vehicle. If the student refuses to unlock the vehicle, the school official may either call the student's parent(s) for permission to open the vehicle or, if there is reasonable suspicion that the vehicle contains illegal contraband, call the police to determine whether or not they have grounds to search the vehicle, either with or without a warrant. If a student or a student's parents or guardians refuse to open a locked vehicle to allow a search by school officials based on reasonable suspicion, or if they remove the vehicle from school grounds to avoid the search, the student's parking privileges may be suspended or revoked as a consequence.

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
